By the time he graduated high school, his aspirations had fully shifted from becoming a computer programmer to pursuing a career as an Architect.

His involvement with the Orlando Chapter of NOMA dates back to 2002. During this time he has volunteered on numerous initiatives to expand community engagement and provide mentorship amongst his peers and aspiring professionals. Through his dedicated efforts, he has played a key role in organizing events, workshops, and networking opportunities that foster collaboration and growth within the architecture and design community. His commitment to mentorship has helped nurture the careers of many young professionals, empowering them to succeed.

In 2022, Jeff was featured in an exhibit at the Orlando Science Center, in collaboration with Black Architects in the Making (BAM). This exhibit, which was part of the celebration of Black History Month, sought to shine a spotlight on the accomplishments of local architects, with the goal of inspiring the next generation of aspiring professionals. The exhibit not only showcased his work but also aimed to broaden representation, encouraging young visitors to envision themselves in similar roles and inspiring them to pursue careers in architecture and related fields. By highlighting these local leaders, the exhibit fostered an environment of empowerment and possibility, providing valuable role models for students from diverse backgrounds.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Beyond his day-to-day commitments, Jeff consistently prioritizes giving back to his community, dedicating his time and energy to initiatives that make a lasting difference. He is deeply involved in projects that support and uplift others, whether through volunteering, mentoring, or helping local organizations. A notable example of his dedication is his participation in Northland Church's Serve Days (Home Repairs). In 2005, Jeff organized HKS Orlando's annual golf tournament and strategically aligned it as a fundraiser for the Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Florida. These funds have gone toward critical programs and resources that support the development and well-being of young people, ensuring they have access to opportunities that might otherwise be out of reach.

ACADEMIA

Each year, Jeff participates in the university's Career Days, where he plays a crucial role in helping to recruit recent graduates, providing them with invaluable guidance on navigating the early stages of their careers. His involvement extends to establishing connections that lead to student internships, offering real-world experience that helps bridge the gap between academic learning and professional practice. In 2021, Jeff, alongside several colleagues at HKS, took a proactive and hands-on approach to fostering collaboration between the professional world and academia by organizing a unique virtual Design Studio partnership with FAMU. Rather than simply coming in at the end of the semester to provide critiques, the HKS team took on a role similar to adjunct professors for the entire semester, creating an immersive learning experience for the students. This allowed them to develop a deeper connection with the students and offer meaningful guidance throughout the design process.

The HKS team met with the students every other week, providing feedback, discussing design ideas, and helping to explore potential solutions to the design challenges students faced. By maintaining this regular, ongoing presence, they were able to offer consistent mentorship, support, and real-time input, ensuring that the students' work evolved over time with careful consideration and refinement. Throughout the semester, Jeff and his colleagues worked closely with the course professor to establish clear project objectives and deliverables, aligning the students' academic goals with real-world design practices. This collaboration created a cohesive and dynamic environment in which the students could benefit from the expertise and experiences of practicing professionals while still having the structure and guidance of their academic framework.

For the final design critiques, the HKS team expanded the experience by engaging the larger HKS office, bringing in a broader range of voices and perspectives. This allowed the students to experience the collaborative nature of professional design, as well as receive feedback from a diverse group of seasoned architects, enriching their understanding of the field. This partnership not only provided invaluable hands-on learning for the students but also strengthened the connection between FAMU and the architectural industry, offering students a direct link to potential career paths and professional opportunities.

For Jeff, his career is not just about designing buildings, but about making meaningful contributions to the fabric of his community. He is passionate about the idea that architecture, when done thoughtfully, can help to bridge divides, promote understanding, and create a sense of shared ownership and pride among community members.
