




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**Design Statement:** The new cancer center represents a transformation in the Northeast Florida health care landscape, re-imagining how cancer care is provided to patients in and around the region through multi-disciplinary, highly-coordinated care. Collaborating to construct the ideal patient experience, innovative teams delivered a trailblazing structure that serves the full continuum of cancer care needs, from screening and diagnosis to treatment and survivorship. The building addresses the need for a hospital in this region to mimic the landscape of the city.

The central courtyard works as an anchor to this building by creating an internal focus for the patient and providing a meditative space for interaction between the patient and the community. The vertical circulation through the tower creates an experience similar to the healing process of the patient. The patient experiences an internally focused and intimate connection through the central courtyard. The view of the courtyard is a reminder as they move through the tower, gradually fading and re-orienting the patient to an external, expansive view of the city. Thus, completing the healing journey, both mentally and physically.

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**Design Statement:** The Architecture at Zero competition challenge is to create a zero net energy building housing a recreation center and the Kinesiology Department at the campus of California State University, Monterey Bay Campus. The design concept is based on one of the key concepts of Kinesiology (the scientific study of human movement): The balance between the Agonist and the Antagonist. One creates the movement, the other the counter movement.

At multiple scales and modalities of locomotion energy is consumed in balance with energy generated. The building conspires with its occupants and celebrates its surroundings, finding an equity in its use of natural resources and harmony in its social responses to the needs of the occupants and community it serves. The final building design for this submission is calculated to be Net Positive Energy (4%).

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**Design Statement:** This 60,000 SF freestanding Emergency Room / Medical Office Building, will become the anchor for the future health campus. The program includes an Emergency Department on Level 1 with 2 Medical Office floors above.

The challenge with this project was to create a floor plate and a structural layout that would allow all programs to stack harmoniously while also providing the flexibility to convert the upper floors into Inpatient Bed Units as the future needs of the community and the health campus grow. The architecture brings nature directly into the building with the abundant use of natural lighting, materiality, and by framing views to the surrounding landscape.

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#### **Rebecca Talbert Vice President/President-Elect** (3 year term)

Over the last 15 years, I have served in many elected roles and lead many committees within AIA Orlando. I have both a broad and deep understanding of chapter operations and historical knowledge of Chapter initiatives. As we conclude our Legacy 2020 strategic plan, it is important that we not loose momentum to execute the remaining goals, like the Center for Architecture. Also, our Chapter must look ahead and outline a plan to guide us into the future.



#### Michael Compton Treasurer (2 year term)

I BELIEVE in the mission of the AIA, specifically, the advancement of our city's quality of life and to protect the public's health, safety and welfare. Networking, advocacy, and informative collaborations will prove the benefits of leadership the AIA can provide in the growth of our city. I have lived that advocacy in two Florida cities and have served on the board for the AIA Jacksonville chapter as the secretary and treasurer; and this past year as the Director of Large position within the AIA Orlando board. It is my intention/understanding that in 2020, I will be the chair of the AAH committee and will leverage that position in concert with the Treasurer position to improve the advocacy of the AIA from a leadership perspective within the healthcare community. As the Treasurer, I would continue the good fiduciary work on behalf of our membership and present the best information at each meeting for sound decision making. Finally, in 2020, I will also be the committee chair for the AAH National's communications committee again leveraging that role to bring nationwide exposure to the wonderful activities happening in Orlando through our leadership. I welcome your consideration and would resign my position as Director at Large if I am elected.

Her responsibilities as Co-Chair included delegating to committees to accomplish tasks and event planning in a timely fashion, including producing graphics, gaining sponsorship, and marketing of events. Through her involvement with YAF, she has helped plan the "NEXT Event" for the past 4 years—an event that highlights local movers-and-shakers making a difference in our community. Since last year, she has worked to stimulate diversity in architecture by serving as secretary on the board for BAM-Orlando, a program under OFA that teaches minority children about our profession. Her BAM-Orlando responsibilities included creating graphics standards, managing notes and records, and implementing ways to enlist volunteers for future planned events. Arlenne has also had a hand in organizing several WIA-O events throughout the last 6 years, including professional lectures, walking tours, art/design socials, and-most recently-a successful networking roundtable that brought together professionals from all aspects of the AEC industry to share their stories of growth and forge new connections.



#### **Taylor Hiltgen Emerging Professionals Director** (2 year term)

During my time at Kansas State University I held a leadership position in American Institute of Architecture Students. AIAS was an organization that was important to me and was a huge help in transitioning into the design world. I was able to gain knowledge, experience and networking opportunities outside of my studies. Since graduating and moving to Florida, I want to immerse myself more into the design community. I feel this position will help me to grow, be more involved and have a greater impact on design, architecture and the Orlando community as a whole. I will be able to bring to the AIA Orlando board reliability, innovative ideas, positivity, active listening, organizational skills, motivation, a different perspective and skills in multiple software programs. 
